





Abandon Hope? Losing Hope? Finding Hope...

CDo not go gentle into that good night. Rage, rage against the dying of the light." ∼Dylan Thomas

I learned the work of Dylan Thomas in the classroom of VC English teacher extraordinaire, Kevin McFadden and those two lines have remained with me since. They have been inspiring in many battles we have faced in our profession since 2009. In the face of incredible odds, can there be a choice other than to go down fighting to the end? If all is to be lost, at least there is solace in knowing you have given all you can give.

The last four years in education have not just been disappointing, they have been horrific. Public education is in crisis when 75% of educators are unsatisfied with their jobs. The work environment is toxic...educators at all levels are feeling watched, judged and generally mistrusted.

By its nature education is full of hope. We touch futures. There is no greater joy in the life of an educator than to see what a student goes on to achieve once they have left you. But finding hope lately has been, at best, difficult and at worst, totally impossible. There is no need to reiterate all the stressors that add to the lack of, actually, the loss of hope. After all, we are all living it daily as we walk into school or talk to anyone in the community. Try telling someone you are a teacher or that you work in education. You might as well as tell them you are diseased for the look that you get.

Every time I talk to someone in education the conversation turns into how much longer? How much longer till you can get out? How much longer do you have to go? How much longer can you take it? Since 2009 I have always held hope that the next year will be better, but instead they have gotten worse. Each year we have endured more cuts, more loss of program, opportunities for kids...more insanity, more loss of control over our profes-



sion and the loss of respect for our professional opinion. This year has been the worst by far. I am fearful of next year but still hope that it will change...it will turn.

After all in the face of the loss, the loss of hope is still in our control as hard as it is to hold on to. Yet, it may be the only thing that will save us, turn the tide so to speak. So where do we find hope?

First and foremost, we find hope in the faces of our kids—our own children and in the faces of the children that we have been entrusted to teach— for if we cannot see hope in the next generation, then we truly are lost. We must always be mindful to keep students in the center of our focus no matter what the stressors that affect us—I learned that from a colleague whose job is in grave danger of being (cont'd on pg 4)

cut dependent upon the result of the budget vote. When I asked her how she keeps going day after day in the face of all of it, she told me she does it for the kids, "because this budget mess is not their fault." It is what she holds on to each day that lets her walk into the classroom with the same smile she has worn from the first day she crossed its threshold. If someone facing being excessed after 15 years with the district can have that much grace, strength and dignity, it should inspire the rest of us to find hope.

I'm hoping that June 8th is the day the tide turns. I hope that on that day the state leqislators realize that holding the state education budget to the same level it has been held to since 2008 and then lowering that amount further with a GAP elimination is unjust to kids. It is simply wrong to allow this generation to have less education than so many generations before it. It is unjust to parents and community members to force us in 2013 to consider closing perfectly good schools, eliminating sports teams, getting rid of Kindergarten, living without art and chorus and band; not having musicals, getting rid of AP classes or college classes, dismantling programs that work, doing without secretaries, paraprofessionals and custodians in schools. I hope on that day that state legislators realize that the greed of testing companies is ruining education and not creating a generation of thinkers as much as it is developing a generation of bubble makers... I have to have faith that NYSUT has planned this moment carefully knowing that now is the time to help us find hope. "This is our moment, our chance to seize public education back from the bureaucrats and billionaires who think they know more about what's best for children than educators and parents," said NYSUT President Richard C. Jannuzzi. "Thousands will gather in Albany June 8 to speak in one voice and deliver a loud, clear message that 'enough is enough.'
